Dear friends in Christ,

A blessed Easter season to all! Over the past 18 months a committee has been going through a planning process called “Re:Vitality”. As part of that program, we were tasked with coming up with a purpose statement. This is a statement that describes our understanding of God’s purpose for placing us in this place, at this time, and for these people. Our proposed statement is: *St. Paul’s Lutheran Church in Columbia exists to proclaim Christ through public worship and the clear and joyous teaching of God’s word in the congregation and for the community. We provide Biblical /Christ centered opportunities through worship, education, fellowship, outreach, mission and human care to individuals and families by reflecting Christ’s love to all.*

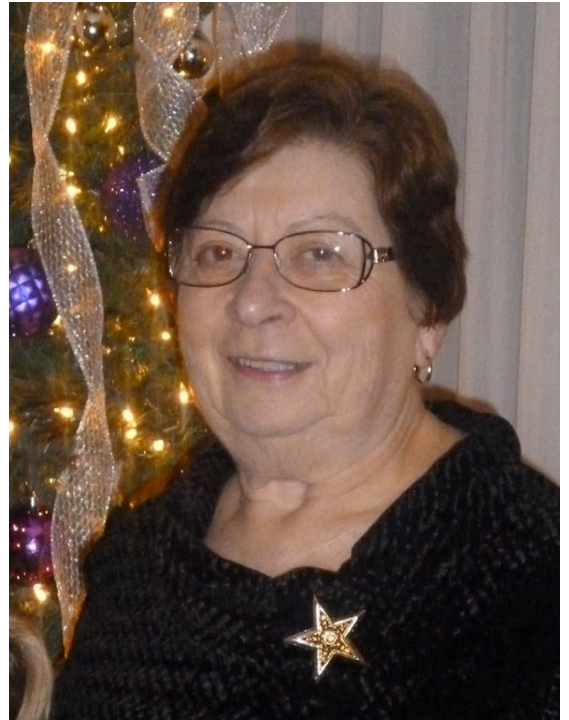

She taught grades 2, 3, 5, and 6 in Ohio, Missouri, and Illinois. In 1969, Helen married Ron and transferred her membership to Mount Calvary in Cahokia. They transferred to St. Paul's in 1974. After starting a family, she switched to substitute teaching in schools mainly in Columbia, Waterloo, and Cahokia.

Helen and Ron were married over 42 years. He passed away in 2012. Helen has three children and seven grandchildren. Karl and his wife Donna live in Columbia with their five: Levi, Hannah, Sophia, Grace, and Madeline. Kendra returned to Columbia after retiring from the Navy in 2017. Krista lives in Florida with

## Board of Stewardship

Each year our congregation joins with 91 others in the Southern Illinois District (SID) of the LCMS to support its ministry work. This year we are sending \$24,000 from our budget towards the district's \$1M budget. Approximately one third of the budget is used for direct mission work including prison ministry, congregational subsidies, university outreach, etc. Another third is used to help cover administration expenses, and most of the remaining third goes to the national Synod. 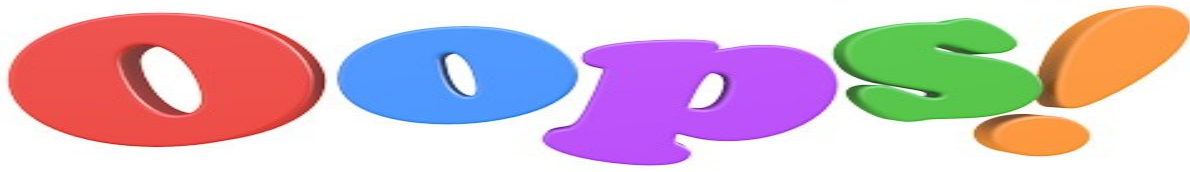

## Meet Our Missions — St. Paul Lutheran High School



Saint Paul is a residential high school committed to preparing leaders to declare Christ. A global mission in the heart of Missouri, Saint Paul has been dedicated to education in the finest Lutheran tradition since 1883.

**History.** In the pre-Civil War era, the area around what is now Concord, MO was very pro-Southern. The German settlers there were pro-Union. They had experienced civil strife and sided with anti-slavery North. For this, they were drug into the streets and shot. The town was founded by a Lutheran German pastor, who when the war was over prayed that there could now be "concord" between the North and South, and named the town with that new hope. In 1883 St. Paul's College was founded by the Reverend F. J. Biltz

with the help of local Lutherans who saw the need for more ministers of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to serve the growing population of the west. The Rev. Andrew Baepler (1850-1927), English missionary for the Lutheran Church (Western District), was called to be the director of the school. Lessons began in his home on January 3, 1884 with a handful of students. As the school grew, more teachers and facilities were added. In 1905, St. Paul was elevated to a college with the addition of two classes. In 1919 the school was closed for a time because of an outbreak of typhoid and was later closed again because of the Spanish Flu epidemic.

Until World War I, instruction was in German; the shift to English language came as a result of anti-German sentiment. Female students were admitted for the first time in 1954 as the church saw the need for trained women in leadership roles. In the 1960s the curriculum shifted from a ministerial focus to a liberal arts focus with a Christian emphasis. At that time programs for teacher education and music were added.

The college was accredited in 1965, but because of declining enrollment, it was dropped in 1986. St. Paul is currently the only residential high school in the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod’s inventory of educational institutions.

**Mission.** The mission of Saint Paul is to provide curricular and co-curricular experiences in a Christian environment that equip students for joyful, faithful service to Christ and His world. Students are academically prepared for a college environment and inspired to see their future vocations as service to God and to one another. The school admits students of all nationalities, faiths, and denominations.

**Campus.** Concordia, Missouri, with around 2,500 residents, is the home of Saint Paul. The campus includes 40 acres, with classroom and residence buildings, a fine arts building, and several large practice fields for sports. The campus is also headquarters of Lutheran Bible Translators.

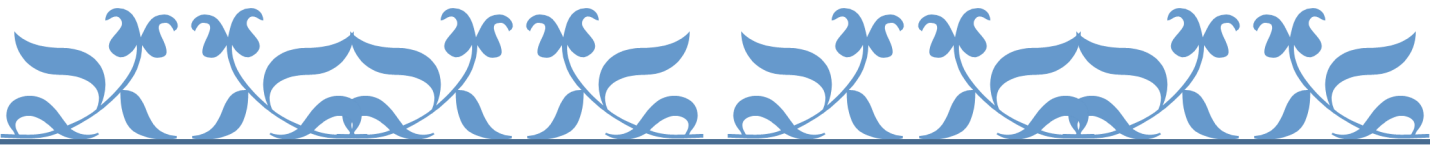
## Women's Ministry

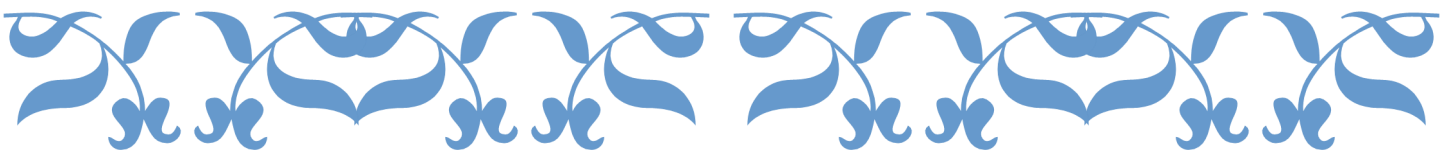
